
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


Q: How satisfied are you with your decision to pursue a PhD?


Very dissatisfied 6%

Q: Since the start of your graduate school experience, has your level of satisfaction increased, worsened or remained the same?












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# Survey of 9,984 individuals who received PhD in Ecology between 1968-2011

Most ecology doctorate recipients have found jobs related to ecology

- Only 3.3% were involuntarily unemployed
- Only 5.6% of all employed ecology Ph.D. recipients reported that their job is not related to ecology.

# Survey of ~3800 employed recent ecology PhD recipients (received their doctorate between 2000-2011)


